

Jewish legacy giving program secures \$16 million in commitments

A two-year legacy giving program in Tampa, Orlando and Pinellas County has secured more than 400 after-lifetime commitments with an estimated value of \$16 million dollars in future financial gifts to the three communities.

The commitments are part of a collaboration between the Tampa Orlando Pinellas Jewish Foundation (TOP) and the Harold Grinspoon Foundation to preserve vibrant Jewish life for future generations by ensuring the long-term financial health of Jewish community organizations.

Nationally, the Grinspoon Foundation has helped its partner communities secure more than 14,000 after-lifetime commitments, valued at more than a half-billion dollars.

TOP was invited to participate in the Life & Legacy program in 2014 after submitting an application and following a rigorous interview process. TOP partnered with the Grinspoon Foundation to help start a community-wide legacy giving program, creating a shared goal for the organizations to work toward.

As a part of the collaboration, TOP coached local organizations as a part of the two-year program in an established program of training and incentive grants to ensure that legacy giving becomes a normal part of the philanthropic culture of the community.

Organizations participating in the program were:

Congregation Beth Am, Hillel Academy of Tampa, Hillels of the Florida Suncoast, Tampa Jewish Family Services, and the Tampa JCC and Federation.

Pinellas County

Gulf Coast Jewish Family & Community Services, Temple Beth-El, the Florida Holocaust Museum, Congregation B'nai Israel, and the Jewish Federation of Pinellas & Pasco Counties.

"TOP was established nearly 40 years ago with this function in mind: to create a secure future for the Jewish community of central Florida," said Emilie Socash, executive director of TOP. "Joining together with the Grinspoon Foundation on Life & Legacy was such a fulfilling and sensible next step in our service to the community."

The three communities celebrated their success in completing the two-year program in May, and each organization completing the program received an unrestricted grant of \$6,000 each year of the program from TOP.

"The result is not in the immediate sense," added Ellen Weiss, TOP's senior development director, "but rather is in the long-term relationships that we are developing with hundreds of community members who otherwise would not have considered themselves in a position to leave a legacy."

"Providing Jewish communities with proven tools and training to help them secure their long-term financial goals is absolutely vital. Through the Life & Legacy program, I'm hopeful that we will be able to help sustain vibrant communities that allow future generations to enjoy our rich



Jewish culture and heritage," said Harold Grinspoon, the founder of Grinspoon Foundation.
